# THE LION IN WINTER

The year is 1183 and Henry, king of England, controls the greatest empire since Charlemagne. The only trouble is that he has three sons, all of whom want to be king, a wife he keeps locked in a keep and a lover who is promised to marry his son.

Eleanore of Aquitaine has arrived in Chinon, released from her dungeon in England and is eager to once again engage her husband in a bitter war of words and maneuvers. But, to what end?

Richard, fresh from the battlefield is in the castle to claim what is his by right of birth. As his older brother is dead he is next in line and

the ablest of all the sons. However, he is not the favorite. He will need more than his broadsword to get to the crown.

Forgotten by history and even his parents Geoffrey, Duke of Brittany, has little chance of seeing the throne. That is unless he can make all other contenders fall from grace. Calculating, devious and determined, he has only one weakness. It is what he has not had all his life that he craves, perhaps even more than his father's kingdom.

Coddled, babied, sheltered and spoiled. John is Henry's chosen son. Ready to be king or not, his is to be Henry's successor as king to

> all of England and most of France. He also gets Alais, sister of King Philip of France, raised by Eleanore herself, for his wife, despite the fact that she is in love with Henry and he with her.

Poor, gentle Alais, taken by Henry as dowry for a marriage to Richard at age 7, she becomes the only pawn in a game full of kings and queens. Henry's lover, betrothed to **THEATER**, n., the building in which productions are presented. **THEATRE**, n., the art of presenting a play.

Richard and promised to John, she has nothing to lose except Henry.

France is at its weakest; England is at its strongest. Their respective kings meet once again. Christmas court at Chinon is Philip's first meeting with his father's old adversary. Phillip became King of France at 17 and is eager to regain what has been lost by his father before him. But, there will be no soft smiles or cordial agreements made this day.

All this taken together equals a family reunion and a Christmas dinner to be remembered.

The Lion in Winter is a wonderful tale of a time when power ruled and love was a luxury. This world is brought to life by a cast and crew that has made my first directing endeavor an adventure and a love in its own right. Though spring be upon us I beg you to hold fast to winters chill for just a bit longer and see who gets the crown, the girl and the whole, black bloody business.

### NEW ONLINE TICKETING SYSTEM FOR NEXT SEASON

For next season, the Williamsburg Players will be introducing a new Online Ticketing System for our patrons.

Online Ticketing is just what it sounds like – you go online via the Internet and access the Williamsburg Players' website. The Online Ticketing System will allow you to see the seating chart for a specific show, including what seats have been sold and what seats are still available. You will be able to select the exact performance night and seats you want.

With the opening of our new auditorium in the fall, our production runs will drop from four weekends (five for a musical) to three weekends. However, we will actually be offering over 1,000 more seats per production run. Shorter runs will allow our stage to be used for other events, such as special shows and other community presentations such as concerts and dance recitals.


The Online Ticketing System will also bring so much more to you. As subscribers, you will select performances when they purchase your season tickets. You will also receive all your tickets in the mail. However, even before seats go on sale to non-subscribers, you will be able to go online and exchange your tickets for a different night if you need to. No more calling the box office and leaving a message and waiting for someone to return your call. You will be able to change your tickets yourself up to three hours before show time.

Non-season tickets for each production will go on sale after the prior show closes (or after the close of the initial Season Subscription drive for the first show). Groups of 20 or more will receive a discounted ticket price automatically. Online Ticketing puts you in control of the nights you attend and the seats you want.

Look for your Season Subscription brochure in the mail later this spring. As a subscriber, your letter will explain how to use Online Ticketing.

As always, our Box Office Staff will still be available to assist you, from answering your questions to making a sale or exchange for you. Online Ticketing puts you in total control of your seating arrangements!
