

# Amadeus

It's a dilemma we've all faced, whether it be in the workplace, the classroom, the athletic field, the performance hall, or just the competition for attention and praise from others: how do we cope with the unfairness so basic to existence, when no

matter how hard we work at something we care about, we can't catch up to the natural beauty, ability, or talent given to another who doesn't even have to try to be better? By fortune alone, someone who gives little effort, who gives much offense, who even squanders gifts thoughtlessly may still reach levels we never will.

That's the cruel truth at the heart of playwright Peter Shaffer's Amadeus brought to you at the Williamsburg Players by our newest director, Catherine Hagner. The place is Vienna, at the end of the 18th century, and through much training, effort, and (he thought until now) talent, Antonio Salieri (Jim Dwyer) has lifted himself from a provincial birth to the highest levels of the court of Emperor Joseph II (Terry Nienhuis). In a city of musicians, he is the young star rising quickly through the hierarchy of court musicians. Until now, his rivals have been men like Count von Strack (Kenny Moskalski), Count Orsini-Rosenberg (Brink Miller), and Baron van Swieten (Bernard Florey), men he understands because they are much like himself.

Salieri's ordered world is changed with the arrival of a child prodigy now entering manhood and looking to stay in Vienna. Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (Trey Heath), as Shaffer writes him, is a musical genius beyond all others, so advanced that his full gift cannot yet be fully appreciated by most, but Salieri sees him for what he is, a composer who with little effort creates music that is the voice of the heavens, that puts his most inspired attempts to shame. Worse, Mozart is an enfant terrible, a silly boy of a man who is dominated by his father and who seems to be as happy making crude jokes as he is making music. In Salieri's jealous eyes, Mozart's immaturity is inflated to an obscenity, a creature given everything by a God indifferent to a dedicated servant. And so a horrible envy grows, as Salieri, with the help of others lowered by Mozart's rise, begins a campaign of vengeance that he imagines he will bring all the way to the creator who has slighted him.

This play is the story of how far a good man can be warped by vengeance, at how jealousy can turn the world against a great talent. Salieri, with the help of his "venticelli," (Jordan Wentland and Michael Moskalski) gossip-mongers who he uses expertly to malign Mozart's every move, begins a game to destroy his rival, even at the cost of innocents like Constanze (Hannah Pecoraro), the young woman who begins as Mozart's playmate, but grows to be his loyal, but endangered, wife.

Sit back and enjoy the manipulations of rivals, the historical costumes, the surprising humor, and the courtly pageant of Amadeus. The skills of our talented cast (including Mike Romero, Jessica Webster, Joyce D'Arcy, and Stephen Fleeson) are on display. Open your ears and let the beautiful music wash over you. But don't leave without thinking a little about one question, would you have acted differently than Salieri?

#### **MOLLIE ROBBINS**



Mollie Robbins was one of the Williamsburg Players' favorite performers for many years. The Players was a fairly new group, just a few years into organizing itself, when Mollie and her husband Leo arrived in Williamsburg in the early 1960s. Shortly thereafter the Players and Mollie found each other and a happy future was assured for both.

Mollie had taken up theatre arts as a hobby while in high school in England. She found she enjoyed it and continued on to repertory and little theatre work afterwards. When she arrived in Williamsburg as a new bride she was more than pleased to find a community theater close to her new home. The Players were equally pleased to find a trained "thespian" ready to join their troupe.

Patrons of the Players loved Mollie for her excellent acting skills and especially her accent. Mollie played aristocratic ladies and quirky scullery maids with equal enthusiasm; perhaps with a different accent, but always genuine London British. When she was not on stage, or working backstage, Mollie loved to meet ticket holders in the lobby and talk about the show or future productions. Her "day job" was for many years as a "Hostess" (now, costumed interpreter) for Colonial Williamsburg where she was widely known and admired

Mollie never got to play the "new theater" but she did enjoy seeing several shows in its "hugeness" as she called it. A survivor of the WPs' "gypsy" years when shows were played in borrowed ballrooms, auto showrooms, and school auditoriums, Mollie nested into the (former) theater on Hubbard Lane and loved her years there. We remember her with respect and love. Her spirit is ever with us.

## A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Born and raised in Northern Virginia, except for brief stint in Oklahoma (where I played with tarantulas . . . but that's another story), I moved to

the Williamsburg area in the early 90s where I remained until I met Christina. Each of us react differently to the experience but the common bond that exists between us is the experience itself - how each of us are moved - that is what I love about theatre - experiencing an event and then sharing our thoughts, our feelings, our emotions - that is the glue that binds us and keeps us coming back for more. If you are ready, volunteer and become an active participant, you might just find yourself hooked like I was!


